PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am proud to present my 2024 President's Message to the members of the Prince George Hospice Palliative Care Society (PGHPCS). The Society has matured and continues to provide the key support to the central/north communities in the fields of hospice and palliative care.

As you know, the Society has developed and is recognized as a 'Centre of Excellence' in hospice and palliative care for the region. The Society has worked very hard over the past 18 months and has received Accreditation from the Hospice Palliative Care Ontario (HPCO). Accreditation means the PGHPCS abides by a set of minimum standards, promoting quality, consistency and professionalism.

These standards set the minimum required expectations that differentiate the operations, work and philosophy of hospice-based services from other health and/or community support services. They promote quality and consistency in the work our Society undertakes each and every day. Accreditation ensures an annual evaluation of our processes, practices, and procedures to the HPCO standards.

The Society is busy implementing its 2023 – 2028 Strategic Plan (the plan can be found on our website https://pghpcs.ca/about/strategic-plan/. In addition to delivering grief support programs in our newly renovated 'Rec-Shed', we are committed to being the employer of choice, leaders in learning, demonstrating and actively supporting diversity, delivering a thriving home hospice program; the Society is evaluating the community need for a possible palliative care centre. We have completed initial research into gaps in care, as we work to determine the feasibility of proceeding with the project.

We know families prefer to spend end-of-life time with their loved one at their home. Our Society has developed a Home Hospice pilot program, which began March 2023 and has proven very successful. The program entails, sending trained staff and volunteers into homes to provide the end-of-life care to support up to 10 people.

Our Society and Board commitment is to provide caring and professional support based upon current needs in communities across the region and is appropriately focused on aligning our work with positive, achievable goals. Please call me if you have questions or comments.

HOSPICE HIGHLIGHTS

Community Programs



This year, we were excited to offer regular programming in the Rec Room. This included 'soundsation', meditation, woodworking, journalling, and games. The Rec Room programming is for those who are grieving, caring for, or living with a life-limiting illness. It has welcomed family and friends who are visiting Rotary Hospice House as well as community members.

"I was happy to be a part of organizing and creating our Art ve group in the rec room... In grief, evenings are often the most lonely time, and getting out of the house to spend time with other people who 'get it' has been cited as one reason people love the Art Hive group. We have painted rocks, decorated records, Zen doodled, created multi-media art, and more." – Facilitator.

"We can speak our minds, and we learn from each other" - group participant.

We continue to offer ongoing staff and volunteer grief support programming, and this year, we provided a new group focusing on Traumatic Loss. There has been an identified need for this type of group in our community.

"The real magic in groups happens with the interaction and connection between the participants, moments when one will say to another " you never would have been able to say that a year ago…". It's the peer support and realizing that you are "normal" and not alone that is so wonderful about groups." – Facilitator

"... there were good times, and there were bad, but through it all, there was love" -group participant.

This year, we organized a Children's Grief Day Camp in June. There was a huge response, and we will offer this again in the future.

"Although it rained for most of the day, it would stop right at the perfect time so the children could participate in outdoor fun activities. It would not have been a successful day without our amazing volunteers. There were ten volunteers. One volunteer was from a dance studio, and another volunteer was a music teacher. I think everyone had a special and fun day." –Facilitator

Home Hospice

In conclusion, the Prince George Hospice Palliative Care Society's Home Hospice program has been a significant initiative in addressing the end-of-life care needs of individuals in the Prince George community. With a strong foundation in providing grief and bereavement services since 1987, the society's commitment to excellence is evident in the innovative programs and services offered, including the Rotary Hospice House.

The Home Hospice program, launched in April 2023, has already shown promising outcomes in terms of reducing hospitalizations, emergency room visits, and caregiver stress while improving the quality of life for clients and their families. The program's success can be attributed to the dedicated Home Hospice Team and the seamless coordination of care between healthcare professionals and volunteers.

Despite the lack of government funding for the program and the decision by Northern Health Authority not to provide funding for the 2024/25 fiscal year, the program has demonstrated cost savings for the healthcare sector. By reducing expenses related to home care nursing and home support, the program has allowed for the reallocation of resources to address the needs of more acute patients in the community, thereby reducing wait times for visits and preventing unnecessary hospitalizations.

Moving forward, the Prince George Hospice Palliative Care Society remains committed to expanding and enhancing the Home Hospice program, with a focus on providing compassionate and dignified end-of-life care to those who wish to die at home. The program's positive impact on clients and families, as evidenced by testimonials and satisfaction surveys, underscores the importance of community-based palliative care in improving both the quality of care and fiscal

responsibility in end-of-life care delivery.



Even more remarkable, we introduced the first home hospice program in Canada, a testament to our community's unwavering support and belief in the importance of our work. We are sincerely thankful for the trust our community has placed in us.



FINANCIAL REPORT

Revenues:

The Dream Home lottery and 50/50's sold out. Northern Health approved a contract lift request to accommodate both inflation and increased compensation for health care staff. The resale shop revenue continues to increase year over year. Wage subsidies were received from various training providers as well as from the Ministry of Health for the wage levelling agreement.

Expenses:

Total expenses remained under budget. There was an increase in overall expenses with the start of the Home Hospice program. Wages also increased as part of the Ministry of Health's wage levelling agreement, reimbursing facilities for the cost to top up staff compensation to the same rate as the HEABC collective agreement.

Capital Spending:

Capital spending included adding and renovating Room 11 in RHH for the Home Hospice Program, renovating the garage into a beautiful Rec Room for programs and events, purchasing a second vehicle for the home hospice program, and commencing the feasibility study for Strategic Goal #1, planning for a palliative care centre by 2028.

Reserves:

The society was fortunate to have a surplus this year which was transferred into the Home Hospice reserve. This program is not funded at this time and the reserve ensures that the society can sustain the program.

Finance Committee Report

We are pleased to inform you that the Prince George Hospice Palliative Care Society (PGHPCS) has successfully maintained its financial sustainability, ensuring the necessary funds to provide exceptional services at Rotary Hospice House, Home Hospice and our community programs and within our community. The fiscal year ending March 31, 2024, yielded a surplus, allowing us to expand our reserve funds for operational sustainability and future infrastructure plans. These developments aim to further enhance the services we offer to the community we proudly serve.

We have successfully implemented and developed the Home Hospice Program. Thanks to careful planning and financial oversight, we were able to provide this service with minimal impact on our reserves. We are currently working with Northern Health to enhance our contract to include this valuable program and hope to secure favorable terms for the next fiscal year.

We extend our heartfelt appreciation to the community for their unwavering generosity. Your continued support of our fundraisers and resale stores has been invaluable. It was a joy to reconnect with the community during our in-person fundraising events, and we are thrilled to announce that the Dream Home Lottery was a sell-out success. Additionally, the two 50/50 draws received remarkable support, showcasing the incredible benevolence of our community. We sincerely thank all our donors for their generous contributions.

The Finance Committee would like to express its gratitude to Anika Lachapelle, Finance Director, for her invaluable contributions to maintaining the Society's financial sustainability. We would also like to acknowledge and thank DMC Chartered Professional Accountants for their diligent work on the 2023/24 financial audit. Lastly, we extend our appreciation to Northern Health for their ongoing assistance and financial support.




