The Board met regularly throughout the year and focused on regular financial re-

views, risk management, fund development and service delivery topics. With the help of Northern Health and Wood Wheaton, we are expanding our care into the community with the message that hospice is about how we care, not where we care.

Over the past year we have updated our strategic plan with the help of Dave Fuller and feedback provided from a number of stakeholders. This plan will guide our actions over the next 5 years in the following areas:

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Prince George Hospice Society saw a surplus of \$48,825 for the fiscal 2017-18 year.

Revenues:

Northern Health provided a 1% increase for 2017, with an additional \$70,000 to support the initiation of a Care Giver Program. We are pleased that NHA has committed to a 7% increase for 2018-19.

- Increases in 2017 revenue were realized in the Resale Shop of 12% and we had a near sell out for the Dream Home Lotto and a sell out for the 50/50 with a prize of \$100,000.
- Memorial Donations were less than anticipated; however, there were some increases in fundraising with new events - Bucket List Gala, and Hearts for Hospice.

Expenses

- Overall spending for our charity this year was just over \$2M, a 5% increase from last year with increases seen in utilities, groceries, medical supplies and insurance.
- Wages and benefits paid to our professional staff for Rotary Hospice House increased by 2% from previous year, as per the new collective agreement with the British Columbia Nurses Union (BCNU) that was negotiated this year.

Capital Spending.

• This year we purchased a vehicle for use in our new Care for the Caregivers Program. The vehicle is purchased in part by contributions from Northern Health and Wood Wheaton. We appreciate their contributions.





The Finance Committee focused on financial monitoring, budget development, banking processes and completed an expression of interest process for banking services. We continue to review all financial policies and procedures. The fiscal year ended, March 31, 2018, reflected a small surplus largely due to the success of the 2017 Dream Home Lottery. We would like to thank DMC Chartered Professional Accountants for their work on the 2018 financial audit.

The Finance Committee was very involved in the budget planning for the fiscal year 18/19. This budget reflects a meaningful increase to our Northern Health funding which was achieved through regular meetings with Northern Health and reporting a clear picture of our financial position and budgets over the last few years. We still anticipate needing to raise \$1.138 million in net revenues during the year. To help us meet this goal, we have our Resale Shop, and various raising events including our 8th annual Dream Home Lottery and 2nd Annual Bucket List Gala.

Nominating and Governance Committee

Nomination:

Turnover due to Directors relocating or taking on new employment has kept the Committee busy with the board member nomination process. The Committee has recruited and recommended 6 new members this past year.

Governance:

Great News. Effective September 20, 2018 – the Transition is filed with the BC Registry. This means our Constitution and Bylaws are now compliant with the new Societies Act.

Fund Development Committee

The Fundraising Committee has been established to support the organization with sustainable funding. Policies and procedures have been developed to ensure we are transparent and aligned with our sponsorship and donors.

The Hospice Society had an outstanding year with events.

Several 3rd party golf tournaments were held and we greatly appreciated being recognized as their charity of choice.

We held our first Bucket List Initiative and Gala. This event was a great success, both as a revenue generator, and as an opportunity to create conversation throughout our community. We are thankful to Wood Wheaton who was the event sponsor. Accent Dental, Carpet Superstore, and Pacific Western Brewery and CBIG. Over \$30,000 was raised at this initial gala.

We had a very successful Antique Fair, where our antique vendors and community treasure hunters continued to support us.

We were delighted to have the Canadian Home Builders Association partner with us in the building of our Dream Home. Thank you to Nechako View Subdivision and Rise Construction for your Gold Sponsorship. The lottery was again a huge success for the Hospice Society and generated 20% of this years revenue.







Our Community

Prince George is very fortunate to have a community Hospice House. Not only are we one of only 4 independent Hospice Houses in British Columbia, we were the first. It is due to the commitment of the community of Prince George that we have a place that people can die in dignity surrounded by friends and family. Two large renovations happened at our Rotary Hospice House this year. What amazed me is that these generous gifts were unsolicited. The community saw the need and acted. The Prince George Hospice Society was the grateful recipient of a generous gift from the Northern Regional Construction Association.

A Love Story

His father had died and he was waiting for the rest of his family to arrive. He came out to get a drink of water and went back into the room to sit with his dad.

I decided to follow him in. I'm so glad I did.

I said, "I really am just checking in to see how you are doing."



Instead of saying I'm okay or just fine, (often that's how people answer me), he started to talk about his beliefs about life after death.

His people, he told me, his people believe that when someone dies they become a star. Their God is the Sun and the stars are what fuels their God. If a star burns brightly, that person lived a good and full life. If the star is dim that is because the person did not live a good and full life.

He said that his father's star will burn brightly.

Then he told me about how his father raised him through example. How he worked up until the day he went into the hospital.

He made sure that he gave me his wisdom, he said, it was really important to his dad that he tell him all that he would need to know without him. How to live a good life. His son was very grateful for his father's caring words.


He said that some people "talk" about their successes, their gains, and their talents. His father, he said, didn't talk about these things at all. He was an amazing man and he lived humbly. He didn't feel the need to brag. His son loved him for this.

His son was aware that his father was successful and was talented and he had some gains and he had some losses, he never had to prove himself though. His son loved him for this. He understands the value of his father's life. He understands that it is his wisdom and his humility that is the most important legacy that his father left him.

I left the room with my heart full. I felt like I was given a gift.

I'm so happy that I decided to go into the room to check in.

People are always telling us here at Hospice how grateful they are for the care and love we give their family. This story is an example of the care and love that that young man shared with me about his father. To hear the love stories here, to be the witness to tenderness.



Humboldt Broncos Loss

The tragic loss of 15 lives has left us overwhelmed with sadness. The suddenness and magnitude of this accident jolts us to the core.

Hockey unites Canada with moments of national joy; but now we are brought together in the deepest sorrow.

We feel grief and sadness because we know how it feels to love. We grieve because we have loved and lost.

Acknowledge your grief – move into it. It's real! The grief and sadness hurts. We feel empty...

And for some, acknowledge the fear and guilt that has been triggered. Parents/ grandparents have sent our sons/daughters and grandchildren off in buses to sporting events. This is a parent's worst nightmare come true.

"Why these kids and not ours?"

Bigger cities and smaller towns are gathering in hockey rinks to remember. We can start to heal. <u>Unite, cry, share and remember.</u>

With this tragedy our hearts have been opened. We have seen an outpouring of good deeds and acts of kindness



- GoFundMe campaigns to support the families of the victims and survivors.
- Hockey sticks left on front porches across the country and even the Parliament building in remembrance.
- Airlines have offered free flights, hotels and restaurants have offered lodging and food so families can travel.
- One of the boy's parents have donated his organs... the Gift of Life in Death.

We honour this loss. No blame in the world will make this less heartbreaking.
